



Dear Readers,





IS TOLERANCE THE SAME AS ACCEPTANCE?

The terms tolerance and acceptance are often used interchangeably in today's discussions. However, upon closer examination, it becomes apparent that there are important distinctions between the two. Each concept has unique implications for how people interact within society and how communities function. Understanding these differences is important to create more inclusive and harmonious societies.

What does tolerance and acceptance mean?

Tolerance is about being **open to different opinions and behaviours, even if we don't necessarily agree with them.** It's about showing endurance and restraint. When we practise tolerance, we acknowledge that something may be different from our beliefs, but we choose not to oppose it. Tolerance is a practical way to get along with others, reduce conflicts and keep everything in order.

Acceptance goes beyond merely tolerating differences; it involves **actively appreciating and embracing diversity.** It signifies a positive acknowledgement and validation of others' identities, beliefs, and practices. When we accept something, we integrate it into our understanding of the world as legitimate and valuable.

The distinction between tolerance and acceptance can be viewed along a spectrum of attitudes:

- 1. Intolerance
- 2. Tolerance
- 3. Acceptance.

The Role of Tolerance and Acceptance in Society

However, it's important to keep in mind that **tolerance has its limits.** Just tolerating others without trying to understand them or creating a sense of unity can lead to superficial harmony, where people simply put up with each other instead of truly respecting and appreciating one another.

Acceptance represents a deeper level of social interaction. **It nurtures genuine inclusion and builds stronger, more resilient communities.** Acceptance involves recognizing the intrinsic value of diversity and seeking to understand and appreciate the experiences and perspectives of others. Acceptance promotes empathy and connection, reducing prejudices and stereotypes. It encourages a collaborative environment where everyone feels valued and respected. This leads to stronger social bonds and a more cohesive community fabric.

For instance, transphobia is something that everybody should consider. Have we ever thought about or considered what transgender people have been through to accept themselves? Most people don't consider the struggles that trans individuals face. **Enforcing the law to integrate them into our society doesn't mean everyone accepts them.** Transgender people often face rejection from their own families. We all know about the well-known transwoman Thanuja Singam, who is a TikTok star and Instagram influencer. She mentioned in an interview how she has been tolerated rather than accepted by her own family and friends. It's natural for them to live this way, even if they didn't choose it. In this society, nobody would willingly live this way due to others' opinions. **Why is acceptance of individuals whose experiences differ from the apparent societal "norm" difficult?**

In some households, there are double standards. For example, they may be okay with certain things their sons do, but not their daughters. **Women are often berated for not conforming to the unachievable ideals that are imposed by society.** There are many factors at play, such as money, relationships, marriage, love, and education. It's puzzling that a son can do whatever he wants, but if a daughter does the same thing, it's considered shameful. **Why is accepting a man's behaviour and justifying it come naturally to people but not a woman's**?

Tolerance and acceptance are related but not the same. Tolerance helps us live together peacefully and manage our differences, but it's not enough to create a truly inclusive society. Acceptance, on the other hand, goes further. It means not just recognizing differences but also appreciating and integrating them into our communities. When we aim for acceptance, we move beyond just putting up with differences to genuinely valuing and celebrating the diverse tapestry of humanity. So, while tolerance and acceptance are connected, they're not identical, and the shift from one to the other can deeply affect personal and social well-being.

THE FINE LINE BETWEEN CULTURAL APPRECIATION AND CULTURAL APPROPRIATION

The constant state of learning and exploring various people around the world, their background, and their cultures is one of the most beautiful things in existence. You learn. You listen. You strive to understand every single person around you. You seek to recognize and commemorate its beliefs and traditions. Appreciation is when a person pursues understanding and learns about another culture to broaden their perspective on different kinds of people, and to connect with them.

However, there is a **difference between appreciating one's culture and upbringing and the adoption of the same in a way that is exploitative, disrespectful or stereotypical.** The act of taking elements of a particular culture causes heavy distortion and misinformation about the whole culture in total. This is cultural appropriation and sadly, it is seen all over the world. Pop culture? Sports? Fashion? Arts? Music? You name it. You can see it.

Cultural appreciation can be a positive experience because it fosters mutual understanding and respect for different cultures. It doesn't highlight any existing power imbalance between the two cultures. There are a lot of times when this goes unnoticed. Oftentimes, **you are not going out of your way to hurt a particular group of people** but by not meaning any disrespect, **taking from another culture for your gain is a form causing cultural appropriation.**

CULTURAL APPROPRIATION IN FASHION:

The **fashion industry has always been rooted in culture,** drawing from it, embracing global exploration, improving the tone of visual design and capturing various eyes. While at the beginning this seemed like a great opportunity to expand on the knowledge of different cultures and backgrounds, bringing exotic textiles and designs into new markets, this slowly metamorphosed into cultural appropriation.

According to **Dr. Benedetta Morsiani,** a researcher at the University of Westminster in London in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultures, cultural appropriation can be defined as **"the act through which specificities of a given culture, such as symbols, artefacts, genres, rituals, or technologies, are used by members of different cultures."** The concept of cultural appropriation can be debated, as the success of culture exchange across the globe. However this now mainly refers to the exploitation of marginalised cultures by more dominant ones. Unlike past centuries, today, fashion houses, brands, and designers are being called out and castigated for taking missteps around cultural appropriation. Be it intentional or unintentional. A recent example is when Gucci faced heavy backlash for its fall 2018 runway show, which featured white models wearing turbans. Furthermore, it is confirmed that the brand had the turban on sale at Nordstrom for \$750. Turbans are not something to be accessorised with to monetize on shows. It is considered a religious object of faith that millions of Sikhs around the world view as sacred. As an aftermath of this issue, Nordstrom apologised and claimed it would no longer sell the piece.

CULTURAL APPROPRIATION IN ART:

Artists create what we already know. Humans are meant to reflect on what we see, hear and observe and we are meant to combine, modify, adapt and borrow. However, artists need to keep in mind the cultural contexts of colours, symbols and techniques employed.

Many critics strongly believe that artists can simply appreciate the styles, techniques, and subject matter of other cultures, not appropriate them. They presume that an **artist should only depict their own experiences in their work, without offending or stealing any element from other cultures**, causing unnecessary disrespect and misinterpretation. On the other side, **another set of critics believe that artists should be able to create what they want,** even if it makes a certain group of people uncomfortable. They claim that limiting an artist to a certain style or technique limits their creativity and the free flow of artistic language.

The line between cultural appreciation and cultural appropriation is delicate but crucial to recognize. While the exploration and celebration of diverse cultures can foster understanding and unity, it is **highly significant that you navigate this area with sensitivity and respect.** When elements of a culture are used out of context, without understanding, or solely for personal gain, the concept of appreciation transcends to appropriation. This distorts and misrepresents the culture —not only that but also perpetuates harmful stereotypes and power imbalances.

Ultimately, appreciating a culture and its aspects means valuing its origins and significance, rather than merely trying to adopt its aesthetics for looks. Individuals and industries can contribute to a more inclusive global community, by fostering genuine respect, rather than forging one's culture for personal benefit. The goal should always be to celebrate and uplift different cultures around the world rather than exploit them, ensuring that the rich tapestry of human experience is honoured and preserved.

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


